



Cooperative Education Programs


- Cooperative Degree Programs with University of Kansas and Kansas State University-(>200 students per year)

Takeaways

- Fully accredited graduate school awarding Masters of Military Art and Science Degree.
 - 344 SAMS and CGSOC students received MMAS in school year 2014.
 - In past five years, 1520 CGSOC students received Master's degrees from partnership and cooperative programs with civilian universities.
 - DLIFLC awarded 11,124 Associate's Degrees since 2002.
- 134 years old. Established as the School for Infantry and Cavalry in 1881.
- Much of the military history we teach was made by students we taught.
- Faculty includes approximately 100 PhDs, 18 former brigade commanders and 58 former battalion commanders.
- Nearly 8,000 international graduates including 27 officers who went on to become heads-of-state in their countries. Three currently serving heads-of-state are CGSC graduates.
